Growing Unusual Berries

I've always been a gatherer. It drives my husband a little crazy I think, that I will stop by the side of the road and happily pick whatever I find, so I try to do my gathering alone. Over near Ashland I found a whole row of ornamental brown leaved plum trees that were covered with little red plums, not to mention all the blackberry bushes on the drive over. These all went into the freezer to later on become jam and a tasty plum syrup that ultimately ended up either as jelly or a refreshing cold drink for the summer. Then there were the Service Berries and Oregon Grapes in a parking lot in Ashland and of course, on the way to Klamath Falls I bagged large clusters of Elderberries growing along the railway line.

What I really like to do though is to grow my own unusual berries. Given the challenge of this climate we live in, it's been trial and error for me over the years. I've been poring through rare fruit catalogs for a long time, and have given a try to anything that supposedly will withstand a US gardening zone 5 winter. For many of those years I lived at Lake Tahoe, which had the same temperatures as Chiloquin but much more snow cover in winter. That snow cover is really beneficial because it insulates the ground, and the deeper it gets the better the plants are protected from the cold temperatures and drying winds. Most winters here there are long periods of cold with no snow cover, and some of those plants that did well at Tahoe are surviving, but getting lots of freeze-back each winter.

Elaeagnus is the genus that comes to mind when I think of freeze-back. The common names for three of the many *Elaeagnus* species are Russian Olive, Autumn Olive and Goumi. They are not olives, but the small trees resemble an olive tree, so I suppose that is why the common name includes Olive. They are pretty plants with a silvery underside to the leaves and small, fragrant cream colored flowers in the spring. Robins love the greenish Russian Olive fruit but it's not something that we would want to eat. Autumn Olive and Goumi though are a different matter. Autumn Olive is a small tree and Goumi a shrub, and both have small red fruits that are quite tart raw, or perhaps you might even call it mouth-puckering tart, but cook up into very flavorful jellies and syrups. In Tahoe my Autumn Olive grew famously, but here the tips of the branches die back by half each winter, while the Goumi doesn't die back at all.

Another shrub that does well here is *Aronia*. It's a lovely shrub with flat clusters of small white flowers in spring that attract bees and butterflies, followed by small, almost black berries in late summer. If you can get the berries picked before the robins descend on them, they can also go straight into the freezer to be turned into a syrup when there's time for such things during the long winter. *Aronia* has yet another bonus in that the leaves turn a brilliant red in the fall, and nothing winter can throw at it seems to faze it in the least.

Seaberry or Sea-Buckthorn (*Hippophae rhamnoides*) is a very thorny shrub that forms impenetrable clumps, which doesn't aid in picking its bright orange berries. It's worth getting stuck a few times though because the berries, though sour when raw, cook up into a delicious somewhat orange/pineapple flavored juice high in vitamin C that is sold commercially in Europe. The Seaberry is native all through Europe and China, growing in dry, sandy locations. It does well here, but plant it where it will not invade your flower or vegetable garden, and where it will get plenty of sun. You will also need to plant two as the male and female flowers occur on separate plants. The flowers are extremely small, hard to see and wind-pollinated. You'll find that a web search for Seaberry will list a multitude of uses for every part of the plant.

I have tried Wolfberry, known also as Goji Berry (*Lycium* species) and also native to Europe and China, but it did not survive the first winter. Still, I might try again. Sometimes the plant just needs to be bigger before it is put to the test of a Chiloquin winter. I'll try keeping it in a pot in a cool, but not freezing place, until it's got a couple of winters under its belt and then try planting it out.

Give some of these unusual berries a try. I'm very glad that I did.

FREMONT-WINEMA NATIONAL FORESTS TO HOST SUMMER INTERPRETIVE CANOE AND HIKING TRIPS

This summer the public will be able to participate in several free natural history interpretive programs. These trips are being hosted by the Fremont-Winema National Forests. All ages are welcome to attend.

For all trips it is recommended that you bring sturdy shoes or boots, plenty of water, hat, sunscreen, lip balm, sunglasses, binoculars and a lunch. Dressing in layers works best because of the temperature variances that tour participants experience throughout the day. For canoe trips, you must supply your own canoe or kayak. Rentals are available from the Rocky Point Resort. Call the resort for information on rates and availability at 541-356-2287.

If you are interested in attending one of the canoe trips and/or hikes, reservations are appreciated. Please call the Klamath Ranger District at 541-885-3400. Area maps are available for purchase from all Fremont-Winema National Forests' offices to assist you. These tours are weather dependent, so if the weather is bad, i.e. heavy rain and wind or lightning, tours will be cancelled.

INTERPRETIVE HIKES

- **July 17 – Ranger Springs (9 a.m. to 4 p.m.) Difficulty – Moderate**

Don't miss an opportunity to join a Forest Service employee on a 6-mile round trip hike that starts at an elevation of 5,600 feet and gradually climbs gentle slopes to the Pacific Crest Trail and Ranger Springs. Hikers will get to view the flora and fauna of the area and experience first-hand a bubbling spring. Your guide will talk about wildflowers, wildlife habitat and wilderness management practices. Meet the Forest Service guide at the Sevenmile Marsh Trailhead at 9 a.m. The trailhead is approximately ten miles west of Fort Klamath, Ore. From Fort Klamath, it can be accessed by traveling east on Nicholson Road to Forest Service Road 3334. There is no fee required to park at the trailhead.

- **August 6 – Badger Lake Trail (9 a.m. to 4 p.m.) Difficulty – Easy**

Take a guided 4-mile round trip hike along the eastern shore of Fourmile Lake. After climbing a small hill, the trail winds within a forested and meadow area, past Woodpecker and Badger Lakes where Bald Eagles are often seen up close. This hike offers great views of Mt. McLoughlin and provides an opportunity for your guide to discuss the flora and fauna of the Skylakes Wilderness and wilderness management practices. Meet the Forest Service guide at the Fourmile Lake campground trailhead. Fourmile Lake is approximately 50 minutes west of Klamath Falls off of Hwy 140 on Forest Service Road 3661. Drive to Fourmile Lake campground and follow signs to the trailhead. There is no fee required to park at the trailhead.

UPCOMING MUSEUM EVENTS

TEMPORARY EXHIBITS FEATURED FOR JULY

Two special exhibits will be shown **through the month of July** at the Klamath County Museum.

One exhibit recalls the contributions of Women Air Force Service Pilots, including five women from the Klamath Basin who served as WASPs. The display includes photos, memorabilia and airplane models, as well as a replica of the Congressional Gold Medal bestowed on WASP members earlier this year.

Women pilots were used in many non-combat assignments, such as delivering planes, ferrying cargo and towing targets for live-fire training. Local women who served as WASPs included Blanche Osborn Ross, Margaret DeBolt Christian, Peggy Parker Eccles, Margarete McGrath Armstrong and Gail Sigford. Relatives of the five women produced the exhibit.

Another temporary exhibit celebrates the 100th anniversary of Camp Fire USA. Designed by Klamath-area Camp Fire leaders, the exhibit includes uniforms and other memorabilia from the program that provides character-building outdoor programs for youth.

Both exhibits can be viewed for free during museum hours, 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Tuesday through Saturday.

LINK RIVER TOUR OFFERED FOR THE DISABLED

The Klamath County Museum and BTS are teaming up to offer a tour of the Link River Canyon for people with impaired mobility. The free outing is scheduled for 10 a.m. Friday, **July 9**, starting at the north trailhead across from Putnams Point.

A wheelchair-accessible bus will transport participants along the upper section of the trail, going as far as the Link River Dam.

This outing is designed specifically for people who would like to learn about the history of the Link River Canyon, but are unable to hike the half-mile to see the dam and other points of interest.

Topics to be addressed include history and wildlife. Participants interested in birding are encouraged to bring binoculars.

Only 15 seats are available on the bus, including two spaces for wheelchairs. To reserve a seat on the bus, call the museum at 883-4208.

RAILROAD SWITCHYARD TOUR OFFERED

An informal tour of the railroad switchyard built by Southern Pacific in the early 1900s will be offered at 9 a.m. Saturday, **July 10**.

For decades Klamath Falls served as important hub for the Southern Pacific Railroad, with repair facilities for locomotives and box cars located here.

Over the years those functions have been gradually shut down or relocated. The box car repair shop closed just last month, and the building has already been torn down by Union Pacific.

The tour will include an up-close look at the turntable where locomotives were turned around (and still are once in a while), as well as the remains of the roundhouse where engines were serviced.

This tour – which is not being publicized anywhere besides The Midge – will begin near the intersection of Adams Street and Wantland Avenue. That’s about two blocks west of East Main, next to the BTS headquarters.
